1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Arun Pratap Singh Dev Government College, Shankargarh was established by the Government of Chhatisgarh on July the 11th 2012 and affiliated to the Saint Guru Univsrsity, Sarguja. The college is situated at Manpur of Shankargarh Tahsil of Balrampur district of Sarguja divion. The campus of the college is spread around an area of 10 acres of land. This is located at an equal distance of 60 Kilometers both from Balrampur and Ambikapur i.e. the district and the division headquarters. Shankargarh Tehsil is largely dominated by the tribal population and is rich in scenic and natural beauty. Mountainous hills, plateaus, green paddy fields and rural atmosphere present a mosaic view and serene view of the landscape. The area of Sarguja has rightly been mentioned in the state anthem of Chhatisgarh as the peacock crown. Whereas, its locate in such a natural, peaceful, pollution free and serene atmosphere is suitable for teaching and quality education, the backwardness of the reason presents many handicaps in imparting proper education. Thus, this proves its path breaking role as the only institution of higher learning. This college is not only doing a commendable work in imparting education and inculcating knowledge among students, but also in developing their overall personality as true citizens of the country. The logo, constituting of a tree in the background of the rising Sun in an open book, rightly represent productivity, multifarious development and knowledge system of the society. All round development through education is the motto of this college. The college is dedicated to the overall development of the Tehsil by training and exploring resources in the fields of tourism, agriculture, handicrafts, biodiversity, minerals and games & sports. 1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

This College is affiliated to the Saint Gahira Guru University of Sarguja, Ambikapur, where Under Graduate courses of B A, B Sc. and B Com are offered. Most of the student studying over here are local and belong to the tribal community. The ratio of female student is more than their male counterpart. The College is run by the academic calendar issued by the Government. In addition to this, the College also prepares its own calendar. Keeping its vision and mission at core, the College also organize various extracurricular activities so that they get moral education also in an overall development of their personality and character. The College also invites feedback from their students so as to analyse and assess the condition and progress of the college.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Teaching —learning and evaluation - The College has been established in the year 2012 and since its inception it is progressing well continuously. 60 seats has been allotted each for B A, B Sc. and B Com. programmes. Most of students are of rural back ground and belongs to ST, SC and OBC communities. Remedial classes are organized for the benefit of weaker students. Along with regular teaching staff, Guest Lecturers are also appointed as per prescribed rules and vacancies against regular teachers. The teacher — student ration is worth satisfying. Teachers of the College are experienced, skilled and dedicated. Along with the annual examinations, students are also assessed and evaluated internally by various means. The functioning of the College is students friendly and if students faces any problem during or after the examination, he/ she is helped out properly using proper means. Teachers explain about outcomes of both course and programme so that students can decide well in advance of their aims and efforts. These have also been uploaded on the website.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Research, Innovations, and Extension – The college is a new college. The college is trying to registered in 2F and 12B for further research. The college organizes online lectures and webinars and plans to organizes these physically also in the near future. Our teachers are well qualified and they publish in different journals on regular basis.

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Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Infrastructure and learning Resources – the campus of the college is spread over an area of 10 acres and the College building contains 9 class rooms, the Principal's room, Office Room, NSS room, Staff room, Common room, library, 4 Laboratories, Store room, Meeting Hall, 2 smart class rooms, Pt. Sunderlal Sharma Study Centre and 4 washrooms. A canteen facility is also available in the college building. The College has set up a rich library in terms of quantity and quality of books. Students are always inspired and encouraged to use online platform of learning maximally. There are enough provisions and space for both indoor and outdoor games and sports. Students of the College also use the local stadium for this purpose. There is provision of pure cold water in the campus.

Every efforts are made to upgrade the level of learning and understanding of students. The management and environment of the College are Students Welfare Committee, Anti Ragging Committee, Prevention of Sexual Harassment Committee etc. have been constituted in the campus. The College has also set up an Alumni Cell and keep a record of them and their activities.

This College is a government run institution. The college follows all guidelines issued by the Government of Chhatisgarh in matters related to overall academic and extra-academic activities. It organizes activities such as admission, teaching, examination, youth festivals, and other institutional activities in an effective and transparent way through various cells and committees constituted for such purposes. To following academic calender college organized staff council meeting at the beginning of the session, departmental meetings, adherence to calendar and monitoring of teaching by the principal through attendance register and daily teaching diary. Despite the facts that this college is just a decade old and is located in a rural and distant block with practical problems, the college is moving in a right direction in terms of work culture, its standard and in direction of students' friendly environment. Through IQAC, planning, execution and vigilance are done for an integrated development of the college. Through janbhagidari samiti, efforts are being made towards infrastructural development as well as towards creation of other resources. NSS is working towards personality development of students and also inculcates a sense of cooperation among students. Students are well represented in all committees and cell constituted in the college for smooth functioning. Students, staff and teachers have to register their presence and their activities are well maintained by the authority. For an overall assessment and that concerning particular issue, students' feedback, stakeholders' feedback are collected and parents' meetings are also organized. From the process of registration to the publication of result, if any problem arises with any student, the college helps and guide students in resolving that problem any time anywhere. Criterion 4 - Infrastructure and Learning Resources

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Response:

The college was established on 11th of July 2012 by the Government of Chhatisgarh. Presently, a total of 356 students are enrolled in the college. The area of the college including the building, garden and field is 4.132 hectare. This college is located in a remote rural Revenue Circle/ Development Block. Since the day of its inception, this college is continuously dedicated to the academic needs and aspiration citizens of the region. This has proved a boon to student who cannot go to distant places for higher education because of his/ her poverty, particularly a female student. The college provides sufficient amenities for learning – teaching exercise. The college building has been constructed as per norms and guidelines prescribed by the government for the purpose. It is naturally lighted and ventilated. The building contains 25 rooms and 5 labatories. The building of the college is double storied with a stage and a big courtyard. Among 25 rooms have been allotted as 9 classrooms, 4 laboratories, one each for Chemistry, Zoology, Botany and Geography, 2 stores Rooms, and one each for the Principal, Office, Teacher's Common room, Sports room, Meeting Hall, Library, NSS & Vivekanand Mulya Anushilan Kendra, Study Room, 2 Smart Classroom (with ICT facility), Common Room, Staff Room. There is a canteen also in the building. All rooms are spacious and installed with lights and fans. All these rooms are situated and parts of the same building. Therefore, all academic, administrative and cultural activities happen in the same but a big building. There are three entrance gates on the ground floor, two staircases for the first floor and two staircases for the roof. The courtyard of the building is also used by students for games and sports and other activities. The college has a big meeting hall with ICT facilities installed in it. Laboratories have sufficient apparatuses for practical works. All class rooms are installed with big blackboards. The ratio of students and available facilities and infrastructure is sufficient. Because of the building being open, spacious and ventilated, it provides freshness and cheerfulness in the atmosphere. Thus it helps in creating a positive and healthy environment as a centre of higher education.

Response:

The college has sufficient facilities and space for Games & Sports and other cultural activities. The college

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is situated in a tribal inhabiting region. The youth of this region is very attracted and interested in playing football; tournaments are organized at various places. From the point of view of games and sports, youth of this region has special capacity, they are very active and sturdy. More than 90 percent of students belong to the tribal community. The college provides facilities in both for indoor and outdoor games. Under indoor games facilities are there for Chess, Table Tennis, and Carom Board. In outdoor games, provisions are there in Cricket, Football, Badminton, Volley Ball, Disc Throw, Javelin Throw, Shot Put and Towing etc. The college campus has sufficient space for Volley Ball, Badminton, Kho – Kho, Kabaddi, Disc Throw, Shot Put, Javelin Throw etc. For Cricket, Football and Race, students use local stadium or the playground of the Intermediate school. One room has been provided for storing only games and sports items. On the occasion of the Annual Youth Festival, cultural and sports are organized where various games are organized and students participate very enthusiastically. They are presented with Medals and Citations. Students of the college also participate independently in tournaments organized outside. For all round development of student's personality, many cultural and competitive activities are organized. They are essay, oratory, debates, paintings, Rangoli, classroom designing, food, mehndi Kala, singing, dance, performing art competitions etc. Such activities help in bringing social cohesion and personality development of the student community. In addition to these, special lectures of scholars are organized in order to refresh and reorient students as well as teachers towards their future study. Through the college run Vivekanand Anushilan Mulya Kendra, an online lecture series is being organized which is proving its worth in providing moral education to students. Similarly, many social activities are organized by NSS Team which provide opportunities to students' community in their personality growth. The college has sufficient space for the organization of such activities, most of these are organized in the courtyard of the college building. Every year, the college organizes the annual prize distribution ceremony where local dignitaries are also invited and they participate enthusiastically.

Since the college has a very limited number of teachers, staff and students, there is little pressure on these facilities. That is why there is little chance of any damage, degradation and loss of any item, material etc. Due to Government building P.W.D is play main role in maintenance and repairing. The college campus is cleaned on regular basis. For maintaining daily hygiene of the toilets, a woman employee has been appointed from the fund of janbhagidari samiti. On the last working day of every month, collective cleaning of the campus is done by students of the college. For transparent maintenance and functioning of the college, all relevant information are uploaded on the website of the college. Internal audit and assessment is done for matching items, materials and movable properties of the college. There is a proper provision for keeping and storing of books, laboratory items and sports goods. 6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

Response:

The college is primarily dependent for its funding on the state government which provides grant under different heads of the budgetary provisions. The maximum share of the budgetary provisions are spent on the salary of teachers and staff, furniture and in upgrading the basic infrastructure. The head of the institution submits proposal for demand of fund every year and the grant is approved accordingly and issued in the form of budget under different heads. The head of the institution spends fund for the development of the institution as per rules and provisions prescribed. Apart from the government grant, janbhagidari fees is also collected from the students, which is deposited in the account of the janbhagidari samiti. That fund is utilized and spent by the Head of the institution for development of the college as per approval from the janbhagidari samiti. A computer operator and a sweeper have been appointed from the fund of the janbhagidari samiti. From that fund, a stage has been erected in the courtyard of the college building. For the development of basic and other infrastructures funds are also mobilized from other sources. A tube well has been and a smart class has been prepared from the MLA's fund. Till now, around two lakhs rupees have been collected as donations from respectable citizens. The college administration is always making all efforts to involve public participation in mobilizing resources for the development of the college. A wired bar fencing of the college garden has been done with the help from the public. In order to seek co-operation from the public at large for infrastructure development of the college, a regular communication channel has been established so that the college does not remain wholly dependent on the government grants only. The fund generated as donation from the public is spent on the development and growth of the library, for preparing posters/ photos/ banners etc. and other utilities with prior approval from the janbhagidari samiti. The college will try to be registered under 2F and 12B section of the UGC act 1956.
